Stewardship in Action: Caring for Land, Connecting People

Every acre protected is only the beginning of the story. With the help of our dedicated group of volunteers, Traprock Ridge Land Conservancy is able to care for the lands and habitats you have helped to conserve while creating opportunities for people of all ages to experience the wonders of nature firsthand.

In early June, we celebrated Connecticut Trails Day with a family-friendly hike from Stout Family Fields to Lake Louise in Penwood State Park. Guided by TRLC volunteers Larry Zemel and Gisele Nee, participants slowed down to experience nature through mindfulness activities and learned the history of Stout Family Fields and the legacy of Curtis Veeder, whose vision helped shape Penwood State Park.

Along the trail, children and adults alike were taught to recognize the mushrooms, lichens, and trees that make these forests so diverse. A particularly exciting highlight was when the children watched with fascination as a northern water snake climbed the kiosk near Lake Louise.

Just a few weeks earlier, TRLC volunteers celebrated Earth Day by partnering with students at the University of Saint Joseph to restore a valuable grassland habitat that serves as both a living classroom for students and an important refuge for wildlife. The main objective of the day was to remove invasive ornamental trees - Bradford pear, Callery pear, and Siberian crabapple - that had begun overtaking the grassland. While these trees produce attractive blossoms, they crowd out native plants that support the insects and caterpillars that birds and other wildlife depend upon.

Armed with hand saws and clippers, volunteers spent the day removing invasive trees and transforming the cut branches into brush piles that now provide shelter for small mammals, reptiles, and birds. Visitors also had the opportunity to learn

about local conservation efforts and discover ways to become involved in protecting the landscapes that make our region special.

Whether restoring habitat, exploring local trails, or sharing moments of discovery with the next generation, every volunteer event reflects the impact of your generosity. Your support protects the places where wildlife thrives, where families build lasting connections with nature, and where our community learns that conservation is an ongoing act of care that doesn't end when land is protected.

Thank you for making these experiences - and the stewardship of the lands we all cherish - possible.

- Hosted or co-hosted **9 educational events** on environmental topics open to all.

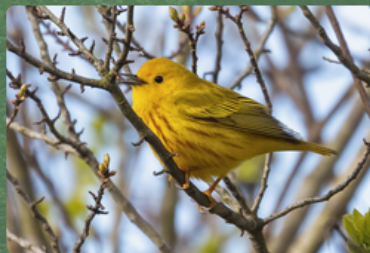

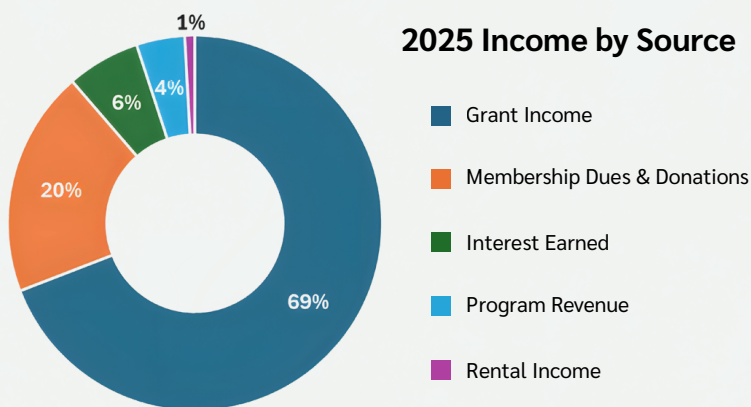

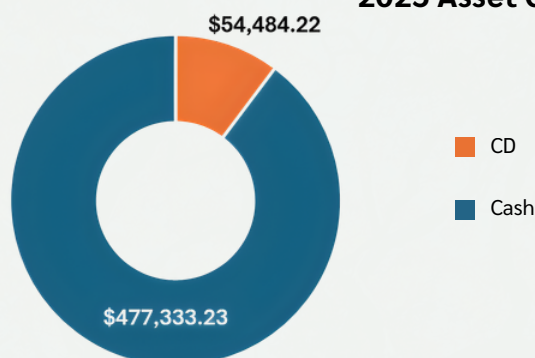

We would like to thank Catherine Delasco and Dale Bertoldi for their many years of service on the Board, and for their continued dedication to TRLC on various committees and in volunteer roles. We also are welcoming three new interns in 2026: Asher Scarlato, Oliva Dallesander, and Maddy Lundell.

We have 5 properties that we are actively working on protecting in 2026. These properties are a combination of donations and conservation easements that will protect more than 150 acres of diverse land including forests, wetlands, and agricultural use.



Helping Create a Homegrown National Park® in East Granby

What if the path to healthier forests, cleaner water, and thriving wildlife began right in our own neighborhoods?

Thanks to people like you who care about protecting the natural world, Traprock Ridge Land Conservancy volunteers are helping bring that vision to life in East Granby through the growing Homegrown National Park® movement.

Entomologist, ecologist, and conservationist Doug Tallamy has inspired communities across the country with a simple but powerful idea: if half of America's lawns were replaced with native plants, together we would create the equivalent of a 20-million-acre national park. Native plants provide food and shelter for birds, butterflies, bees, and countless other species while reducing the need for mowing, fertilizers, pesticides, and excessive watering. They also improve air and water quality and support healthier habitats and wildlife.

Inspired by one of Tallamy's presentations this spring, Hartford Audubon Society members Vicky and Paul Margiotta saw an opportunity to make a difference at the Greenstone Hollow Nature Preserve in East Granby. While most of the 38-acre preserve consists of forest and wetlands, a three-quarter-acre mowed lawn at the property entrance offered the perfect place to demonstrate how native plantings can transform wildlife habitat.

With support from the Hartford Audubon Society and the dedication of volunteers including members of Traprock Ridge Land Conservancy, the area is being transformed into a vibrant native landscape. Volunteers planted 14 native trees along with 37 native shrubs and perennial plants chosen to support pollinators and birds throughout the seasons.

Oaks were selected because a single mature oak can support thousands of insect species, forming the foundation of a healthy food web. Native shadbushes and mulberries will provide spring blossoms for pollinators and late-summer fruit for birds such as Cedar Waxwings. Eastern Red Cedars will offer year-round shelter and nutritious berries for wildlife. TRLC member Chris Fisher arranged irrigation from a neighboring property to help the young plantings become established during their first growing season, while volunteers from both organizations continue to water and care for the site.

Perhaps the greatest impact will be felt by the next generation. The neighborhood children who gather nearby each day to catch the school bus will watch this landscape change over the coming years -

from a mowed lawn into a thriving habitat alive with butterflies, songbirds, and native plants. Because of your commitment to conservation, they will see firsthand how small actions can create lasting change for wildlife and our communities.

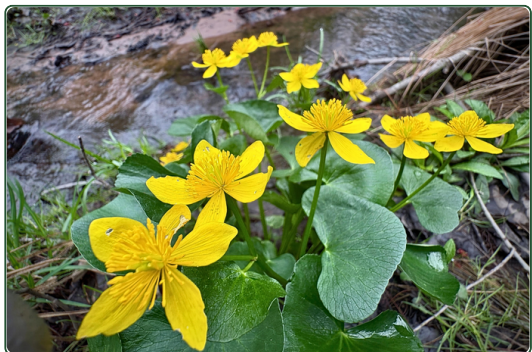
